1. Profile of practice population and PPG

PRACTICE POPULATION

The Northolme Practice is a well established training practice in an urban part of Calderdale. The practice has a population of over 13,500 patients. There are currently 5 GP Partners and 1 Salaried GP at the practice along with a Nurse Practitioner, Practice Nurses and Health Care Assistant.

The practice operates across two sites at Kos Clinic and Northowram. The practice area serves patients living in Hipperholme, Lightlcliffe, Norwood Green, Bailiff Bridge, Hove Edge, Northowram, Shelf and Stump Cross. Patients can register and be seen at either of the practice sites.

The practice population includes a mix of social backgrounds and there are no areas of high deprivation across the practice. The practice has a very low number of patients from ethnic minority groups which is borne out with national data.

PATIENT PARTICPATION GROUP

The Patient Participation Group has been re-established following a publicity campaign. From the patients who have volunteered and completed a questionnaire, the following information has been established:

- The Patient Participation Group covers a wide range of ages
- There is a well balanced representation of male and female patients
- A large proportion of patients in the Group are not from an ethnic minority group
- The Group has a representation of patients who have a disability
- The Group has representation from patients who are carers

In order to try and engage with a cross section of patients not represented in the Group, the practice has:

- The Practice has written to a random selection of patients from an ethnic background inviting them join the Group
- Working with Health Visitor who has contact with young families and groups to target the younger population

- Practice website
- Slips on repeat prescriptions
- Written invitations to the previous Patient Participation Group Members inviting them to join the Group.
- Letter and leaflets sent to a random selection of patients from ethnic minority groups extending an invitation to join the group.

The Patient Participation Group and the Practice have agreed to meet quarterly at either of the surgery sites. The meetings are held early evening.

All communication with members will take place via email or post.
